(50% of grade) Students will spend 56 periods at Ward Melville High School (24 periods in special education settings) and 32 periods at Riverhead Middle School interning in mathematics classes. Students will submit the PEP time sheet and ask cooperating teachers to submit evaluations for all cooperating teachers they work with including special education staff. Students will keep a journal summarizing each period.

(10% of grade) Students will attend each class and give an oral presentation of his/her work.

(10% of grade) Students will complete math content homework related to weekly discussions.

(10% of grade) Students will write a 5 page essay on an open ended question related to the high school experience citing the dispositions and code of ethics.

(10% of grade) Students will write a 5 page essay on an open ended question related to the middle school experience citing the dispositions and code of ethics.
